Linda's Fund was set up in 2006 to improve educational provision for over 600 pupils of Mulanje Mission Community Day Secondary School in Malawi, through bursaries and school projects. Girls and boys have equal access to the funds. Mulanje School is partnered with Fortrose Academy on the Black Isle in Scotland.

Charity News

We had sufficient funds to start 2 new students in 2023. After a quiet year and lack of funds, following the Pandemic years, a further 2-3 students are being allocated in 2024 which will bring us back to 4-5 students a year in total. We have been delighted to have been allocated funds from the Pignatelli Foundation and also received more personal donations since the end of our financial year allowing us to be more optimistic.

Since the start of Linda's Fund in 2006 36 students have now been awarded bursaries for the following subjects.

Mulanje School News

Mulanje school is growing with the largest enrolment of 750 since the school opened in 1989. Evening classes have grown from 225 to 488. Teacher pupil ratio is 1 to 75 or even 1 to 80 and there is a need for additional furniture for students due to the increases.

Academically, the pass rate for national exams grew from 66.7 last year to 99.75 this year and 7 students went to university which is rare in most of the rural community schools. This year the school have produced the best results in a region of 122 schools and were awarded several prizes including a laptop for their success.

Malawi

Malawi is one of the poorest countries in the world. The estimated population of 21 million (2022) is expected to double by 2038. The economy is heavily dependent on agriculture, which employs over 80% of the population, and it is especially vulnerable to climatic shocks. Following Tropical Cyclone Freddy in 2023 Headline inflation rose to 28.4% in July 2023. Food inflation reached 39.3%.

Finances

All UK funding goes to Malawi with no costs in UK (apart from bank charges). Linda's Fund is run by a small group of volunteers. Our accounts year end is June but figures below also show the situation at the end of the calendar year.

Our yearly expenditure in 2022/23 was £2070 and income, all from donations, was £2141. The fund maintains reserves to allow students to complete their courses. Since the end of June we have received numerous individual donations and an award from the Pignatelli Trust leaving us with a working balance of approximately £8000. The Fund has charity status in the UK and over the years has distributed over £74,000. This money has been raised by generous donations from individuals, sponsored events, pupils fundraising, company donations and The Pignatelli Trust. The long-standing link between Fortrose Academy and Mulanje Mission continues and is supported in both communities.
